- I don't see them **anywhere**.  
- But they must be **somewhere** in this room.
- Listen. There is **someone** in the garden. You should not (=solltest nicht) leave **anything** in the car at night.  
- I'll have a look. I can't see **anybody**. There is no burglar in the garden.

### Compounds of "some" and "any"? 6e\_some\_any\_03\_L

- Come and have **something** to drink.
- Is there **anything** in that box.
- Don't leave **anything** in the car at night.
- Listen. There's **somebody** in the attic. Let's call the police.
- Did **anyone** telephone when I was out.
- Did you see **anyone** behind the house?

- There is **some** milk in that glass.
- She wanted **some** stamps but there weren't **any** in the machine.
- I'm sorry, there isn't **any** coffee left.
- Is there **anybody** one who can speak Italian?

- There's **some** whisky in the cupboard but there aren't **any** glasses.
